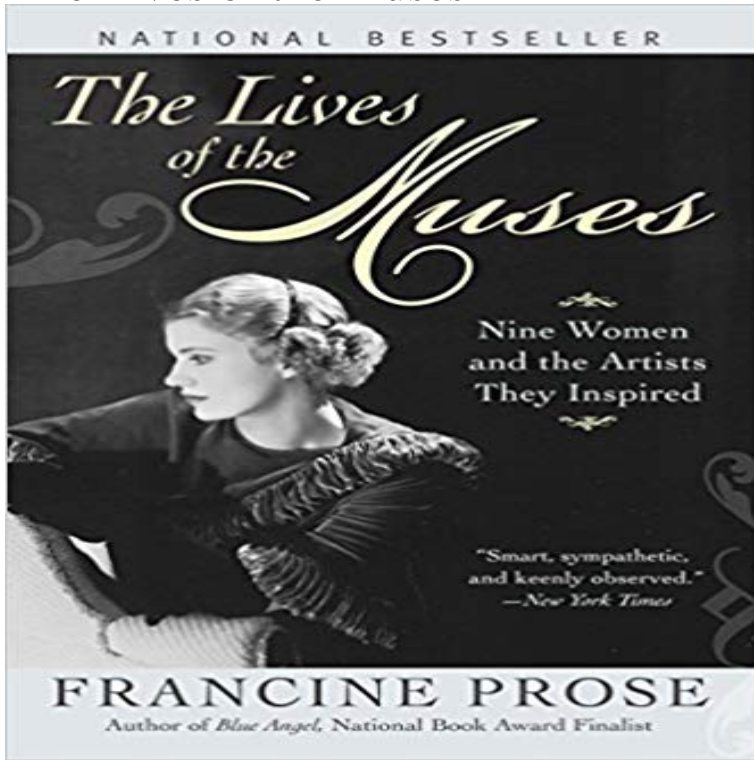


The Lives of the Muses
